Swamperella is a Toronto based Cajun band in its 10th year of popularity. Spicy, melancholy, toe tapping, sexy, the Swamperella experience defies listeners to stay seated! Swamperella's expression of music is deeply rooted in Cajun tradition and the band's original material attests to a profound understanding of and connection to the 'Louisiana sound.' This band has played a

myriad of venues and whether the show is in a barn in Gaspé, Quebec for the 400th anniversary of Acadian history, or at Brock University performing with the Niagara Symphony Orchestra, Swamperella rocks! And people respond! The music is infectious and the Swamperella approach is to pull out all the stops.
