Green Activist Corner

In the Fall of 2008, CUPE Local 3012 members at the Saskatchewan Council for International Cooperation adopted a Workplace Environment Policy. A few months later, Sister Denise MacDonald – who led the charge to adopt the policy – reports that the policy is having a huge impact on improving the environmental performance of her workplace.

"There is more recycling and composting and far less waste. At our events, we have stopped using disposables and have cut back on paper considerably," Sister MacDonald explained. She added that her workplace is starting to develop a green culture, where the environmental impact of the work is now regularly taken into account.

Sister MacDonald urges other CUPE Locals to put green issues on the agenda at their workplaces. For example, working to adopt an environmental policy, bargaining green language and forming workplace environment committees. Local 3012's policy has even become the envy of workplaces that share building space with the Saskatchewan Council for International Cooperation in Regina. Other organizations are now taking Local 3012's policy and applying it to their own operations. Well done Sister MacDonald.

New: guide, fact sheets, workshop

UPE is developing a new online guide to setting up workplace environment committees. The guide will spell out how a workplace committee could be established, how it should be structured, how it should function and what environmental issues should be addressed. Some CUPE workplaces have already set up workplace environment committees, and provide examples of how committees operate. Look for this online guide to be launched on the CUPE National website for Earth Day, April 22, 2009.

A new series of fact sheets on water conservation in the workplace are also being developed. Look for those to come online at cupe.ca mid-2009.

The Union Development Department of CUPE National,

with assistance from CUPE's National Environment Committee, CUPE economist Toby Sanger and senior officer Matthew Firth, has developed a new environment workshop for CUPE members. The course was first offered in a November 2008 test run in in British Columbia. The new four-day environment workshop, called Green Action, is made up of learning modules, each one focused on a different environmental challenge. There is an introductory module on what is happening in our environment, one on climate change, one on water, one on how to green our workplaces, one on greening the union, and one on taking action in the community.
