NEHAWU Researcher

In 1993, he received a United Nations bursary to complete his BA degree at the University of Cape Town and went on to complete his MA honours degree in industrial sociology. He then relocated to Johannesburg and worked in the National Department of Land Affairs as a gender

researcher when he became active in NEHAWU as a branch shop steward.

As a NEHAWU member, he helped mobilise resistance against the wholesale privatisation of state assets and against job losses in the public service. He has been active in setting up community-based structures to mobilise residents in the inner city of Johannesburg to resist evictions and fight for service delivery.

He joined NEHAWU as a national organiser in the education sector in April 2005 and has since transferred to the policy development unit. He has been active in the launch of the "Public Service Delivery" campaign.
