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### SuperBuild Update: Public-Private Partnerships in Ontario's Colleges and Universities

#### **Competing for the Construction dollars**

The Ontario government announced its SuperBuild Infrastructure projects in Ontario's colleges and universities with great fanfare in February of 2000. 35 projects were chosen from the many submitted. These were for new construction. Later in the spring of 2000, the government chose 24 other projects for the renovation of existing buildings. The government argues that their 'targetting' of infrastructure projects is an efficient way to spend public money.

Universities are not evaluated only on the basis of the individual projects they submit. Through a competition, post-secondary institutions must prove they have created more space for students by increasing the use of buildings during the evening and in the summer; creating co-op programs, distance education and partnerships between colleges and universities.<sup>1</sup>

In September 2002, the government announced two new projects. In December 2002, the Ontario Government asked Ontario's colleges and universities to submit a new round of SuperBuild proposals. The deadline was January 27, 2003.

### What is SuperBuild?

As described by the Ontario Government:

The Ontario SuperBuild Corporation works together with public and private sector partners to set priorities and create innovative capital investment, privatization, and commercialization proposals to respond to our province's growing infrastructure needs.<sup>2</sup>

While the Ontario government committed just over \$981 million to infrastructure projects in Ontario's colleges and universities, this represents less than half of what is required for these projects to be completed. Communities and institutions applying for funding must demonstrate they have commitments from other public and private sector funders.

As described by CUPE, these infrastructure projects are just another example of public-private partnerships, or P3s. Public subsidies for corporate profits - What a partnership!

#### **New Announcements 2002**

The Fall 2002 announcement of SuperBuild funds for post-secondary institutions in Ontario was largely a non-event. In fact, as outlined in the Tables that follow, the government used the opportunity to re-announce funds that had been already committed.

The government talks about its increased contribution to new buildings and upkeep of our colleges and universities. But it keeps reannouncing the same money!! Yes, there was an increase in funds between 2000 and 2002: *Private and other public funders increased their investment in post-secondary education infrastructure by 50 percent!* 

The Ontario government made only two new commitments. First of all, the government needed to rectify a serious error in judgement that had underfunded construction at the University of Ottawa. Even by SuperBuild standards, the University of Ottawa didn't get its share, receiving only \$7 million in the 2000 round of SuperBuild funds. The Fall 2002 announcement committed \$30 million to the building of a new Biosciences complex at the University of Ottawa. \$29 million is expected from private money and other public sources.

This commitment, however, still does not solve the problem of underfunding at the University of Ottawa. In total, SuperBuild funds will provide *half* of the funding required for spaces for 2,680 additional students at the University of Ottawa. The University expects 5000 additional students to enrol in coming years.<sup>3</sup>

There was a second new component in the September 2002 announcement. The Conservative government announced it would open a new institution called the University of Ontario Institute of Technology. This institution will be governed by a board that will run Durham College as well. SuperBuild committed \$60 million to the development of the first phase of the project. No private funds have been announced yet, but we fully expect to hear a lot more about privatization and post-secondary education through this new institute. The Institute is expected to provide spaces for 2,870 students eventually.
